What can churches really do?

Churches Can Legally...

Support or oppose legislation*

Teach on moral issues and civic involvement

Participate in distributing nonpartisan voter guides

Encourage members to voice their opinions in favor or opposition of certain legislation**

Educate on the political process and social and legislative issues.

Discuss biblical instruction pertaining to moral and cultural issues such as abortion, same sex marriage, etc.

Provide church facilities for political candidates (if all candidates are allowed or invited)

Engage in voter registration activities that avoid promoting any one candidate of a particular political party

*A church, or any other 501(c)3 organization, may without limitation support or oppose legislation that directly affects the organizational structure and operation.

**Churches and other 501(c)3 organizations may support or oppose legislation so long as such activity comprises an insubstantial part of the overall operation (5%-20% - ADF).
501(c)4 organizations may support or oppose legislation without limitation.

Churches Should Avoid...

Endorsing or opposing political candidates

Contributing to Political Action Committees or political candidates

Campaigning and fundraising for candidates

Granting use of name to support a political candidate

Supporting or opposing judicial candidates
